

Bright ideas

Ontario's solar task force is looking for ideas from anyone interested in harnessing the sun's energy. A province-wide consultation with the public and the renewable energy industry is looking for answers to three questions: what are the barriers to the installation and use of residential solar hot water systems in Ontario, how can they be removed and what actions could be taken by governments, the solar indus-

try and others to expand residential solar hot water markets in the province? The provincial task force will present the findings in a report to the energy minister in October.
